FINANCE MINISTER PRESENTS WHITE **PAPER ON TS' FISCAL STATUS, SAYS OUTSTANDING DEBT AT Rs 6,71,757 CR**

No money even to meet daily expenses: Bhatti

Presenting a grim picture of the State's fiscal status with an estimated outstanding debt of Rs 6,71,757 crore by the end of the current financial year, the Congress government on Wednesday declared that Telangana was staring at a debt crisis.

Presenting a 42-page white paper on Telangana's finances during a short discussion in the Assembly on Wednesday, Deputy Chief Minister and Finance Minister Mallu Bhatti Vikramarka said the total debt of Telangana was Rs 72,658 crore in 2014-15. Telangana, which was a revenue surplus State in 2014 and has one of the fastest growing economies in the country, now had no money even to meet daily expenditure, he said.

Blaming the financial indiscipline by the previous government during the last 10 years for this fiscal stress, he said due to the increased fiscal stress, the State had to depend on the ways and Would you like to subscribe to means of advances from the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) on a daily basis.
