#### Gives govt 3 weeks to respond to applications

#### PTI NEW DELHI

The Supreme Court on Tuesday asked the Centre to respond within three weeks to applications seeking a stay on implementa-tion of the Citizenship (Amendment) Rules, 2024 till the apex court disposes of the pleas challenging the constitutional validity of the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2019.

The apex court, however, refused to stay the operation of the rules that would give effect to the CAA, as sought by a battery of senior advocates representing the petitioners. The Centre, on its part, told the Bench headed by Chief Justice DY Chandrachud that the CAA does not take away the citizenship of any person.

The Bench, also comprising Justices JB Pardiwala and Manoj Misra, issued notice to the Centre on the 20 applications seeking a stay on the implementation of the Rules returnable within three weeks. "We are not expressing any prima facie

# Nimesulide drug linked to vulture deaths

n a major move to save the critically endangered keystone species of vultures, the Drug Technical Advisory Board (DTAB), the committee of experts that advises the Central government, recommended a ban on veterinary use of Nimesulide, the non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug (NSAID), which is administered frequently for pain relief to livestock, and re-

lief from fever to humans. The DTAB was acting on a recent report from the Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS), the voluntary organisation actively involved in the conservation of the vultures in India. The BNHS, in its report, indicated that Nimesulide is rampantly

used in cattle and other veterinary purposes. Invariably, when the vultures feed on the carcass of such animals, they too tend to absorb Nimesulide. One of the important extant risks that the vulture populations in India are still facing is the veterinary use of Nimesulide to treat cattle. Nimesulide, similar to diclofenac, aceclofenac and

ketoprofen, have been found to be toxic to vultures, leading to mortality through visceral gout and renal failure, the BNHS in its assessment report submitted to DTAB said.

About a year ago, the safety-testing studies of Nimesulide on vultures were carried out collaboratively between BNHS and Indian Veterinary Research Institute. (SEE PAGE 2)
