**Canopy collapses at Rajkot airport**

**Kejriwal in judicial custody till July 12**


**Medak mishap: Toll touches six**

## Adani to collect Old City power bills

The State government is reportedly planning to hand over some Electricity Circles in Hyderabad to private companies to contain Aggregate Technical & Commercial (AT&C) losses. As part of this, the Old City area, which falls under the Hyderabad South Circle, will be handed over to the Adani Group. Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy re-

vealed this to the media in Delhi two days ago, according to reports. Officials sources confirmed that high-level meetings were held in this regard by the government and that the Cabinet too was in favour of handing over power supply and bill collections to the Adani Group. Sources said Adani Group representatives had already gathered information from the Telangana State Southern Power Distribution

Company Ltd with regard to power bill collections and the difficulties being faced by it. A corporate team of Adani Group has been studying the power supply and other issues related to the Old City for the last few months, sources said. According to officials, in order to hand over responsibilities of distribution and bill collection to the private sector, the State government has to grant permission to the Dis-

## DSC, Group-II dates worry aspirants

Teacher job aspirants hardly have any breathing time for the Group-II recruitment examination scheduled in August. The District Selection Committee (DSC), a recruitment examination for teacher posts in the government and local body schools, detailed schedule issued on Friday ended up nearly clashing with the Group-II exam. The School Education Department scheduled the DSC exams from July 18 to August 5, while the Group-II exam for 783 vacancies is on August 7 and 8. The close range of these exam dates has given an impetus to the already existing demand of the aspirants for

deferring the Group-II exam till December. **CBT mode** One of the aspirants, Nagaraj, preparing for both DSC and Group-II, said the School Education Department has already said it cannot defer the DSC, citing the unavailability of slots as the exam is held in computer-based test mode. The aspirants, according to Nagaraj, have decided to represent the issue to Telangana Public Service Commission (TGpsc) and Chief Secretary A Santhi Kumar on Monday and seek the Group-II exam postponement. "Majority of teacher job aspirants have registered for the Group-II exam," he said. (SEE PAGE 2)

## Scribe held in NEET-UG case

The CBI conducted searches at seven locations in Gujarat on Saturday in connection with the alleged irregularities in the NEET-UG exam and arrested a journalist in Jharkhand, officials said. According to them, Jamaluddin Ansari, a journalist with a Hindi newspaper, was arrested for allegedly trying to help the principal and vice principal of a Hazaribagh school, both of whom are accused in the paper leak case. Oasis School's principal Ehsanul Haque and vice principal Imtiaz Alam have already been arrested by the federal probe agency in connection with the case. The CBI searched the premises of suspects in Anand, Kheda, Ahmedabad and Godhra of Gujarat. (SEE PAGE 2)

## 5 soldiers killed in flash floods

**T-72 tank swept away in Shyok river in eastern Ladakh**

**NEW DELHI**

Five soldiers, including a junior commissioned officer (JCO), were killed during an exercise early Saturday as their Russian-origin T-72 tank was swept away following flash floods in the Shyok river near the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in eastern Ladakh, officials said. Defence Minister Rajnath Singh said he was deeply saddened by the unfortunate accident that occurred in the river near Saser Brangsa. Two T-72 tanks were trying to cross Shyok around 1 am and one of them got stuck in high currents in the river, the officials said, adding the melting of snow resulted in the increase in the water levels. The Army deployed rescue teams but the mission didn't succeed in view of the raging waters in the river. The deceased personnel were identified as MRK Reddy, Subhan Khan, Bhupendra Negi, E Teibam and Sadarbania Nagaraju. "Deeply saddened at the loss of lives of five of our brave Indian Army soldiers in an unfortunate accident while getting the tank across a river in Ladakh," Singh said on X. "We will never forget exemplary service of our gallant soldiers to the nation. My heartfelt condolences to the bereaved families," he said. "The nation stands firm with them during this hour of grief," he said. **Close to LAC** The soldiers belonged to the 52 Armoured Regiment deployed at Daulat Beg Oldi (DBO) military base in the strategically located region close to the LAC with China. "... While de-inducting from a military training activity, an army tank got stuck in the Shyok River, near Saser Brangsa, Eastern Ladakh due to sudden increase in the water level," the Army's Leh-based Fire and Fury Corps said. "Rescue teams rushed to the location, however, due to high current and water levels, the rescue mission didn't succeed, and the tank crew lost their lives," it said. "The Indian Army regrets the loss of five brave personnel while being operationally deployed in Eastern Ladakh. Rescue operations are underway," it said on X. Army Chief Gen Manoj Pandey and all ranks of the force condole the death of the five personnel. Gen Manoj Pandey and all ranks of the Indian Army express heartfelt condolences on the loss of five brave soldiers who lost their lives during a training activity in Ladakh, it said. (SEE PAGE 2)

## Patancheru sees 3 dog attacks a day!

Street dogs continue to pose a serious threat to humans and livestock across the erstwhile Medak district, with the Patancheru Area Hospital alone recording 96 street dog attacks in the last 28 days. The death of a six-year-old boy at Isnapur on Friday has exposed how serious the issue was, even as five street dog attacks were reported under Patancheru mandal on Friday alone. Patancheru Area Hospital RMO Dr Praveen said that they had recorded 96 dog attack cases from June 1 till June 28, which meant, more than three persons were being bitten by street dogs in Patancheru mandal

alone every day. The number could be more, with several cases going unreported. While some of the victims were going to other hospitals, a few others were receiving treatment in private hospitals. Most of these victims were children, he noted. Recently, a street dog went on a rampage, biting 10 persons in a day in Lakdaram village. With the population of street dogs multiplying due to lack of birth control measures, dogs were now regularly seen chasing two-wheeler riders everywhere. In a few incidents, two-wheeler riders sustained severe injuries after falling off their bikes while being chased by street dogs. (SEE PAGE 2)

## Centre clears way for merger of Cantt areas with GHMC

The long-awaited aspiration of the Secunderabad Cantonment residents appears set to be fulfilled with the Union government issuing guidelines for the merger of the civil areas under the cantonment board into the GHMC. The efforts, initiated by the previous BRS government and the consistent efforts of the then MA&UD Minister, KT Rama Rao, in the issue finally reached a culmination with the issue of guidelines. The Defence Estates Organisation issued broad guidelines principles for excision of the civil areas of different cantonments, including Secunderabad Cantonment, and their

territorial jurisdiction of the State municipality is proposed to be extended to entire civil areas of the cantonments leaving out the military station. **Title rights** The Centre will retain wherever it owns the title of rights over the land. Accordingly, the GHMC would extend to the residential areas of the cantonment, except the military station. While dividing these areas, the Centre has made it clear that security of the armed forces should be given top priority. In accordance with the guidelines laid down by the Centre, the State government and Cantonment Board officials have been directed to clear the doubts and take further action. As per the guidelines, the proprietary rights over all assets meant for providing civic amenities and municipal services in the excised areas would be transferred to the State government/municipalities free of cost. Also, the assets and liabilities of the cantonment boards would be transferred to the State municipality. It was also clarified that the

## Panel to decide 'genuineness' of weaver suicides

**Compensation will be extended based on report**

The State government's compensation to the kin of weavers who died by suicide might not reach all the families, with the government so far acknowledging only six of the 12 reported deaths as suicides. Even these six suicides will undergo stringent scrutiny by a three-member committee that has been set up to probe the genuineness of the suicides. The names finalised by the committee after going through multiple aspects will be recommended to the State government for compensation by the district administration. This year so far, seven weavers from the Sircilla textile town alone have died by suicide, while there have been more than three from other districts, including Karimnagar and Khammam. Most of these were due to lack of employment during the last six months, with weavers and ancillary workers pointing out that they were out of work after Bathukamma sarees, Christmas and Ramzan gift orders not being issued by the State government. and Textile Minister Tummalapudi Nageswar Rao, earlier this week, said the suicides would be probed and pegged the number of weaver suicides at six. Accordingly, the Handlooms and Textiles Department set up a committee headed by the Revenue Divisional Officer, while the Assistant Director of Handlooms and Textiles is the member convener. The District Deputy Superintendent of Police is the third member of the committee. Speaking to

'Telangana Today', Assistant Director (Handlooms and Textiles) M Sagar said the committee would decide the genuineness of the suicides. After getting the final report, including FIR copy, postmortem report and other details on each death, the panel would take a decision after going through all facts. The names finalised by committee would be sent to the State government for compensation through the District Collector, he said. (SEE PAGE 2)

## Veteran Congress leader DS passes away
