7 IEDs neutralised in Manipur

Govt stifles farmers' voices as anger rages

Ryots, including those in CM's Kodangal, under house arrest

HYDERABAD/KODANGAL

With the promised crop loan waiver yet to reach several lakhs of farmers across the State more than a month after Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy's promised deadline of August 15, unrest among farmers is continuing in the State, with Thursday witnessing a crude attempt by the Congress government to quell their voices before they took their protest to the State capital.

Starting right from the Chief Minister's own constituency of Kodangal, farmers came out in large numbers onto the streets in response to a call by farmers' unions for a 'Chalo Praja Bhavan' protest programme but were either placed under house arrest or bundled into police vehicles and detained for hours so that they would not be able to reach Hyderabad.

In Bomraspet mandal in Revanth Reddy's Kodangal constituency, farmers, including Dalits, actually were continuing their protest for the third consecutive day when they were taken into

custody. Demanding waiver of their crop loans, they were demonstrating in front of the State Bank of India when the police took the farmers and their union leaders into custody.

However, undeterred by the police crackdown, several organisations, cutting across political affiliations, participated in the protests. 'In many villages, 50 per cent of farmers are yet to get their crop loans waived. Of-

ficials are insisting on ration cards despite the State government announcing that they were not mandatory for the crop loan waiver," said SC, ST, BC Minority Hakkula Porata Samiti district president Chandraiah.

"As per the Warangal Rythu Declaration, the Congress government should also extend financial assistance to tenant farmers and farm labourers," Lambadi Hakkula Porata Samithi chief Surya Naik said. Madiga Reservation Porata Samithi district president Subash and others were also part of the protests.

Meanwhile, across the State, farmers who planned a massive 'Chalo Praja Bhavan' protest programme saw police swooping down on their homes since Wednesday night and detaining them, citing concerns of disruption of law and order.

close, will the issue of approvals pick up pace is the big question. In the past, Telangana built an image of working with speed, and investors secured permissions without any hassles under TG-iPASS, with Foxconn chairman Young Liu famously appreciating what he called 'Telangana Speed'.

However, that was in 2023. Things have changed, with a few reputed companies even shifting base from Telangana. That was not all. Amaraja Raja Energy and Mobility chairman Jayadev Galla had recently expressed con-

cerns over the State government's financial health and whether it would be able to commitments made to the firm, failing which his group might have to 'look elsewhere' for its plant's capacity expansion. Though the days ahead appeared to look promising, especially after Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy claims of securing investments worth Rs 40,232 crore from Davos and investments worth Rs 31,500 crore during his US trip, the register of new units in the State hasn't had as many entries as last year or the year before.

Row over animal fat in Tirupati laddu

Day after Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu accused the previous YSRCP government of using animal fat in making the Tirupati laddu, Social Welfare Minister Dola Sree Bala Veeranjaneya Swamy said that a comprehensive inquiry will be conducted into irregularities in Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanam (TTD).

The Minister said that the Chief Minister repeated what the officials had already stated about the quality of ingredients used in making laddu, also known as Tirumala laddu. The Chief Minister, in a TDP meeting, claimed that during the YSRCP rule, the laddu used to be made with substandard ingredients.

He accused YSRCP leaders of tarnishing the sanctity of the hill shrine. "They compromised on the quality

'Lab report' finds 'beef tallow'

AMARAVATI: The TDP on Thursday claimed that the adulteration in laddus has been confirmed by Gujarat-based livestock laboratory, NDDB CALF Ltd on the ghee samples. TDP spokesperson Anam Venkata Ramana Reddy in a press conference displayed the purported lab report which apparently confirmed the presence of "beef tallow" in the given ghee sample. PTI

Pannun files lawsuit against Indian govt

NEW YORK

Khalistani separatist Gurpatwant Singh Pannun has filed a civil lawsuit against the Government of India and National Security visor Ajit Doval, with a US court issuing summons in the case.

In New Delhi, Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri termed imputations "unwarranted and unsubstantiated." "These are completely unwarranted and unsubstantiated imputations. Now that this particular case has been lodged, it doesn't change our views about the underlying situation," he said. The summons issued by the US District Court for Southern District of New York in the civil action lawsuit state that a response to the summons must be given within 21 days. Discoms for hike in power charges STATE BUREAU

The State-run power Distribution Companies (Discoms) have proposed to revise electricity charges in the State. The Annual Rev-Requirement Report (ARR) for the current financial year (2024-25) was submitted to the Telangana State Electricity Regulatory Commission (TGERC) late

on Wednesday. The discoms proposed to revise the charges in all three categories. If the recommendations are approved by the ERC, the discoms estimate that they will get an income of Rs 1,200 crore to cover the deficit. The ERC will give a final verdict after conducting public hearings on these proposals in at least three places across the State. After that, the revision of charges will come into effect. This whole process takes 90 days.

(TGSPDCL) and the Northern Power Distribution Company of Telangana Limited (TGNPDCL) have estimated a deficit of Rs 14,222 crore between their income and expenditure this year. In this amount, Rs 13,022 crore have been requested to be provided by the State government through the Budget. These two organisations said that they are giving proposals for revision of charges to cover

the remaining shortfall of Rs $\,$ 1,200 crore.

charges for houses up to 299 units. According to the discoms, more than 1.30 crore houses in the State have electricity connections. As them use less than 300 units, the increase in fixed charges will not be a burden on most people, discoms observed.

At present, there are three types of connections in the general category of HT industries. Earth to have another moon!

The planet Earth is all set to have a 'mini-moon'! A tiny rock (asteroid) named 2024 PT5, which was reported by Asteroid Terrestrial-impact Last Alert System (ATLAS), an asteroid early warning system funded by NASA in the University of Hawai, will be orbiting our planet till Nobefore vember-end,

escaping the Earth's gravity. Labelled 'mini-moon', the discovery of the small asteroid triggered a lot of excitement among the community of amateur and professional astronomers, not only in India but across

the globe. The near-Earth object is expected to come within 5,67,000 km of Earth during

its closest approach. This distance is roughly one and a half times the average distance to the moon, according to reports.

Rare event While the size of the 2024 PT5 is significantly smaller than the moon, the temporary orbiting of the asteroid, which is only 33 feet in width, is a rare event that occurs once in a decade or 20 years. Interestingly, according to the research lead author and Universidad Complutense de Madrid professor Carlos de la Fuente Marco, the 2024 PT5 originated from the Arjuna asteroid belt between Mars and Jupiter, this celestial visitor offers a rare opportunity for scientists to study near-Earth objects up

Condemning the Congress government's proposal to allot 10 acres of Dr BR Ambedkar Open University (BRAOU) land to Jawaharlal Nehru Architecture and Arts University (JNAFAU), teaching and non-teaching staff of the Open University on Thursday staged a protest on the university campus demanding the government to withdraw the proposal.

A large number of employees protesting raised slogans against the Congress government and threatened to intensify protests if the proposal was not shelved. To strengthen their efforts, the teaching, non-teaching and technical

staff of the Open University formed a Joint Action Committee (JAC), which will spearhead the protests and put forward their demands. The employees also submitted a representation to BRAOU Registrar Prof E Sudha Rani.

The State government is actively considering allocating 10 acres in the BRAOU campus JNAFAU, and a final decision is expected after the

Cabinet meeting, which is scheduled for Friday. The State government might also allot the present INAFAU campus to the Telangana Education Commission, recently established with former bureaucrat Akunuri Murali as its chairman.

The BRAOU, the first open university in the country, has been extending distance education to students from economically weaker sections and rural areas in 53.63 acres of land in Jubilee Hills since 1982. Stating that BRAOU's enrollment has been increasing every year, the IAC said the existing buildings and infrastructure were insufficient, and already causing a lot of inconvenience to students.

Criminal contempt case against BJP MP

The Telangana High Court took strong exception to remarks made by M Raghunandan Rao, BJP MP from Medak, during a recent press conference. A twojudge division Bench, comprising Chief Justice Alok Aradhe and Justice J Sreenivas Rao, initiated a suo moto criminal contempt case against the MP based on a letter from a single

judge of the court. The letter reveals that during a press conference on August 24, Raghunandan Rao questioned the court's decision to grant a "stay of demolition" concerning a petition filed by actor Akkineni Nagarjuna's N Convention via a House Motion. He reportedly raised con-

cerns about how the court could issue a stay when a previous ruling in 2014 directed the demolition of the same property. The MP's comments included assertions that judges should not rush to make decisions based solely on House Motions and criticised the judicial process as "injudicious.

'Omnibus allegations' Raghunandan Rao's re-

marks were described as making omnibus allegations against the judiciary, including claims that stay orders are often granted without proper scrutiny of the circumstances. He questioned the efficiency of the court's Registry in listing cases and called on the Chief Justice to address these issues.
