

356 killed as Israel bombs Lebanon

24 children among dead, over 1,240 injured in strikes

BEIRUT

Lebanon's Health Ministry said the death toll from Israeli strikes in Lebanon on Monday increased to 356, including 24 children.

The barrage is the deadliest since the 2006 Israel-Hezbollah war as the Israeli military warned residents in southern and eastern Lebanon to evacuate ahead of a widening air campaign against Hezbollah. Thousands of Lebanese fled the south, and the main high-

way out of the southern port city of Sidon was jammed with cars heading toward Beirut in the biggest exodus since 2006.

More than 1,240 people were wounded in the strikes, the Health Ministry said — a staggering one-day toll for a country still reeling from a deadly attack on communication devices last week. The toll surpassed that of Beirut's devastating port explosion in 2020, when hundreds of tonnes of ammonium nitrate stored in warehouse detonated, killing at least 218 people and wounding over 6,000.

Meanwhile, in a recorded message, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu urged Lebanese civilians to heed Israeli calls to evacuate, saying "take this warning seriously." "Please get out of harm's way now," Ne-

tanyahu said. "Once our operation is finished, you can come back safely to your homes," he added The Israeli military said

on Monday evening it had carried out a targeted strike in Beirut. It did not give details. Lebanon's state-run National News Agency reported the Beir al-Abed neighbourhood in southern Beirut was hit with three missiles. Hezbollah's Al-Manar TV said six people were wounded. The area was cordoned off and journalists were not allowed access. Lebanese Health Minister Firass Abiad said the earlier strikes hit hospitals, medical centres and ambulances. The government ordered schools and universities to close and began preparing shelters for people displaced from the south. AP

Possession of child porn material an offence: SC

In a path-breaking judgement, the Supreme Court on Monday held that mere possession of any child pornographic material will constitute offences under the POCSO and the IT laws even if they are not disseminated further.

Observing that "sexual exploitation of children is a pervasive and deeply rooted issue that has plagued societies worldwide and been a matter of serious concern in India", it termed as "egregious" the verdict of the Madras High Court on the issue and set it aside.

On January 11, the HC had quashed the criminal proceedings against a 28-yearold man charged with downloading pornographic content involving children on his mobile phone, saying

BRS fact-finding panel arrested

Police on Monday arrested members of the BRS factfinding committee, formed to investigate maternal and infant mortalities at Gandhi Hospital and assess the condition of government healthcare across the State. Former Deputy Chief Minister Dr T Rajaiah, MLA Dr K Sanjay and former MLA Dr Metuku Anand were among those detained before being taken to the Narayanguda police station. The arrests took place as the committee was on its way to Gandhi Hospital, with heavy police presence deployed at the site.

Despite attempts by police to block their movement, Sanjay and Anand, along with BRS MLA Maganti Gopinath, managed to

reach Gandhi Hospital, where they were arrested. Similar actions were reported in Warangal, where BRS MLA Palla Rajeshwar Reddy was also detained ahead of his planned visit to the local government hospital.

The BRS committee members, all medical professionals, maintained that their visit was a non-political effort to assess public healthcare and offer recommendations.

Why is the government afraid of our visit? Are they trying to hide the maternal and infant deaths in Gandhi Hospital, or are they scared that their failures will be exposed?" they asked.

BRS working president KT Rama Rao condemned the arrests, calling it an attack on transparency and accountability. (SEE PAGE 2)

India reports first Mpox case of Clade lb strain

NEW DELHI

India has reported the first case of the Mpox strain, which led to the WHO declaring it a public health emergency last month, in a patient from Kerala who had tested positive last week, official sources said on Monday.

They said Clade 1b strain has been detected in a 38year-old man from Malappuram district, who recently returned from the UAE. The patient is stable, the sources said, adding that "this was the first case of the current strain that led to the World Health Organization declaring Mpox a public health emergency last month for a second time". The earlier case that emerged in the national capital was a 26year-old, who tested positive for Clade 2 strain. PTI

TTD performs purification rituals

Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanams (TTD) Executive Officer J Shyamala Rao on Monday said devotees can set aside their apprehensions regarding laddus at the temple as the sanctity of the prasadams have been restored with a four-hour

purification ritual. The ritual was aimed at propitiating Lord Venkateswara Swamy from the alleged sacrilegious practices such as mixing animal fats in making Tirupati laddus and others. "The holy ritual was a sin-free ritual. As part of it Vastu Suddhi (and) Kumbhajala Samprokshana were carried out by the ritwiks (priests)," Rao was quoted as saying in a press release. According to the temple

of Vaikhanasa Agama in the Yagashala (ritual place) of Tirumala temple from 6 am to 10 am to ward off the ill effects, and restore the sanctity of laddu prasadams and other naivedyams (food offerings to deity) along with the well-being of Srivari (deity) devotees. Priests were seen sprin-

kling holy water in *potu* (kitchen where laddus are made) and on the ingredients. Rao said devotees can set aside their fears about the quality of laddu prasadams and naivedyams.

Venugopala Deekshitulu, one of the chief priests, and Agama advisor Mohanarangacharyulu said rituals such as Sankalpam, Vishwaksena Aradhana, Punyahavachanam, Vastu Homam, Kumbha Pratista, Panchagavya Aradhana body, Shanti Homam was were performed. PTI conducted as per the tenets
