4 of family killed in road accident SANGAREDDY: Four persons of a family died in a road accident after an RTC bus, belonging to Karnataka, rammed their bike on the Zaheerabad-Bidar road at Ganeshpur in Nyalkal mandal on Monday. The deceased have been identified as Gunelli Siddam (59), his daughter Biradar Renuka (35), her husband Biradar Jagannadham (41) and their son Vinay Kumar (12). Further details are awaited. The bodies were shifted to a government hospital in Zaheerabad for a postmortem examination. The Haddanur police have registered a case.

### **Rs 120 cr cocaine** seized in Gujarat

GANDHIDHAM: Ten unclaimed packets containing 12 kg of cocaine, valued at Rs 120 crore in the international market, have been recovered from a creek area near Gandhidham town in Gujarat's Kutch district, police said on Monday. A preliminary probe suggested that smugglers might have hidden the contraband near the creek to avoid getting caught, Kutch-East division Superintendent of Police Sagar Bagmar said. This is the third major drug recovery from the same creek area in one year. PT


Despite mounting public outrage and criticism from the Opposition, the State government is moving forward with the Musi Riverfront Development Project and has awarded the consultancy contract to a consortium led

by Meinhardt Singapore Private Limited. The selection of this

firm, which has been embroiled in several controversies, has raised serious concerns about transparency and accountability in the execution of the Rs 1.5 lakh-crore project. In an official order issued on October 4, Principal Secretary for Municipal Administration and Urban Development M Dana Kishore confirmed the awarding of **DESERVE BETTER** the contract for 'aggregate master planning' to a consortium that includes

Meinhardt Singapore, Cushman & Wakefield India and RIOS Design Studios. The consultancy fee is set at Rs 166 crore, agreed upon at a 'negotiated offer price' — a move that has drawn sharp criticism for the lack of transparency in the tendering process.

The government's decision to bypass global tenders for such a high-profile project has added fuel to the fire. The



criteria were used to select this particular consortium?" questioned a senior BRS leader.

The controversy is fur-ther amplified by Mein-hardt's troubled track record. The firm is currently under investigation in multiple countries for its involvement in various scams. In India, the Anti-Corruption Bureau of Jharkhand is probing irregularities in the appoint-ment of Meinhardt as a consultant for the Ranchi sewerage drainage project, dating back to 2005. The Comptroller and Auditor

General also had flagged anomalies in Meinhardt's work on that project, while courts questioned the firm's eligibility. Meinhardt was also entangled in Pakistan's infamous Creek Marina scam. In 2023, the country's Federal Investigation Agency registered a case against Meinhardt's owners and senior officials for their alleged role in a multi-billion-rupee residential project scandal. ## **KTR slams CM** for ignoring people's welfare

**HYDERABAD:** BRS working president KT Rama Rao on Monday criticised Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy for prioritising the Musi Riverfront Development Project over people's welfare and development. He said the CM was claiming that the State was drowning in debt while simultaneously initiating grand programmes such as the Musi project with Rs 1.5 lakh crore. "Every day, Revanth Reddy keeps crying about the State's mounting debts on one hand, but is undertaking costly initiatives like the Musi Riverfront project, which is not necessary for many," he said, questioning the reasoning behind

the State government's plans. Taking to X, Rama Rao listed out numerous poll promises of the Congress government, which remain unfulfilled even after 10 months. He questioned how the government planned to fund the Musi project while claiming to have no funds to implement crucial medicines in hospitals, chalkpieces and other stationery in schools, fishlings and sheep distribution, and other schemes," he asked.

Clearly stung by the mounting criticism against HYDRAA demolitions and eviction of residents for the Musi project, the Congress government has set in motion attempts to build a counter-narrative even while sticking to the 00

two initiatives. Hitherto, it was only Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy who spoke eagerly about the project and the demolitions, with statements from most of his Cabinet colleagues being tepid statements. However, with the high command reprimanding the State leadership for the approach, Deputy Chief Minister Mallu Bhatti Vikramarka on Monday came out in support of the demolitions, stating that there was no personal agenda behind the HYDRAA demoli-

tions or the Musi evictions. Trying to build an eco-friendly image for the government, he said the only agenda was to save lakes for future generations. He also tried to counter the charges by opposition parties, saying they were making baseless allegations, misleading the people and creating apprehensions on the Musi project. Addressing a press conference, Bhatti Vikramarka even made a PowerPoint presentation on encroachments of lake areas. Interestingly, the statistics he presented were only from 2014 to 2023, obviously with a political motive against the previous government.

Neither did he make any mention on how the previous government had changed the situation

when most lakes across the State were dry in 2014 to how they were brimming with water in 2023. Instead, he said the area of water bodies within the Outer Ring Road was about 3,586.12 acres and the encroached area since 2014 was about 386.71 acres. "If this continues, there

will be no lakes left in Hyderabad. That's the reason HYDRAA demolitions are being taken up," Vikramarka claimed.

However, when asked about the government's plans for identified en-

croachments in lakes within the ORR, including for Hussain Sagar and those abutting Necklace Road, his reply was evasive and people should suggest what had to be done. "If people and opposition parties do not want lakes to be protected and desist from the Musi Riverfront project, so be it," he said, also insisting that one should note that a beginning was made. # American duo bags Nobel in medicine

#### STOCKHOLM

The Nobel Prize in physiology or medicine was awarded on Monday to Americans Victor Ambros and Gary Ruvkun for their discovery of microRNA, tiny pieces of genetic material that alter how genes work at the cellular level and could lead to new ways of treating cancer.

The Nobel Assembly at the Karolinska Institute, which awarded the prize, said the duo's discovery is "proving to be fundamentally important for how organisms develop and func-tion". "Their groundbreaking discovery revealed a completely new principle of gene regulation that turned out to be essential for multicellular organisms, including humans," the assembly said.

Ambros performed the research that led to his prize at Harvard University. He is



currently a professor of natural science at the University of Massachusetts Med-School. Ruvkun's ical research was performed at the Massachusetts General Hospital and Harvard Medical School, where he's a professor of genetics, said Thomas Perlmann, secre-tary-general of the Nobel Committee.

Ambros and Ruvkun, the assembly explained, were initially interested in genes that control the timing of

different genetic developments, ensuring that cell types develop at the right time. To do that, they studied two mutant strains of worms commonly used as research models in science. The scientists set out to identify the mutated genes responsible in these worms and what their role was. The mechanism they ultimately identified — the regulation

of genes by microRNA has allowed organisms to evolve for hundreds of millions of years. The Nobel committee said Ambros and Ruvkun's discovery ultimately "revealed a new dimension to gene regulation, essential for all complex life forms." MicroRNA have opened up scientists' approaches to treating diseases such as cancer by helping to regulate how genes work at the cellular level, according to Dr Claire Fletcher, a lecturer in molecular oncology at Imperial College London. ## Airshow deaths: Rs 5L ex gratia for victims' kin

MK Stalin on Monday said the turnout for the October 6 IAF airshow here far exceeded expectations and acknowledged that people were highly inconvenienced and assured better arrangements for similar events in the future.

The State government said over 15 lakh people gathered on Sunday to witness the event, while it had expected approximately 15 lakh to attend. Expressing anguish over the death of five persons due to the scorching sun and various underlying causes, Stalin said their deaths were an irreparable loss for their families. He said he told authorities to release Rs 5 lakh to the kin of each of the five deceased. PTI

Two Chinese nationals were killed and 17 people injured in a suicide attack by a Baloch insurgent group that targeted a convoy of Chinese workers near Pakistan's busiest airport here late on Sunday.

The explosion near the Jinnah International Air-port also killed the suspected suicide bomber. The attack comes less than two weeks before the SCO's summit to be held in the national capital.

The banned Baloch Liberation Army (BLA) claimed responsibility for the attack, saying the blast was a suicide attack targeting a convoy of Chinese engineers and investors leaving the airport. The attack occurred less than a mile from the airport's main ter-

#### About 85 per cent of the world's cryptocurrencies are worth less than one cent, according to a report

on Monday. The total number of cryptocurrencies has been floating between 8,500 and 10,000, with new tokens being launched every time a bull run in the crypto space begins.

Currently, the total number of cryptocurrencies remains at a high of 9,861. However, most of them have little or practically no value. As per data analysis by AltIndex.com, 85 per cent of all cryptocurrencies circulating in the market are worth less than one cent. It also showed 9,525, or 96 per cent of all coins circulating in the crypto space, are worth less than a dollar. IANS
