Israel attacks Iran

Tehran says it has right to self-defence

TEL AVIV

Israel attacked military targets in Iran with pre-dawn airstrikes on Saturday in retaliation for the barrage of ballistic missiles the Islamic Republic fired on Israel earlier this month.

The strikes marked the first time Israel's military has openly attacked Iran. Following the airstrikes, Iran's Foreign Ministry said it had a right to self-defence, and "considers itself enti-tled and obligated to defend against foreign acts of aggression". Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi said Iran has "no limits" in defending its interests. But late on Saturday, Iran's military issued a carefully worded statement suggesting any ceasefire in Israel's ground offensives in the Gaza Strip and Lebanon would trump any possible retaliatory strike.

Israel's military said it targeted facilities that Iran used to make the missiles fired at Israel as well as surface-to-air missile sites. There was no immediate indication that oil or nuclear sites were hit, which would have marked a much more serious escalation. Iran's state-run IRNA news agency said four people were killed, all with the country's military air defence. It did not say where they were stationed.

Iran's military said the strikes targeted military bases in Ilam, Khuzestan and Tehran provinces. The strikes risk pushing the archenemies closer to allout war at a time of spiraling violence across the Middle East, where militant groups backed by Iran — including Hamas in Gaza and Hezbollah in Lebanon — are already at war with Israel.

US President Joe Biden said Israel gave him a headsup before the strikes and said it looked like "they did-

LIMITED DAMAGE, SAYS IRAN

TEHRAN: Downplaying the impact of Israeli airstrikes that targeted its territory, Iran accused the IDF of exaggerating claims about the scale of the attack. Citing a source, a news agency dismissed reports suggesting that hundreds of Israeli aircraft were involved in the attack, labelling it as an attempt by Israel to exaggerate its actions. It further claimed that Israeli fighter jets did not enter Iranian airspace. IANS

INDIA EXPRESSES CONCERN

NEW DELHI: India on Saturday said it remains "deeply concerned" by the evolving escalation in West Asia and its ramifications for peace and stability in the region and beyond. "We reiterate our call to all concerned to exercise restraint and return to the path of dialogue and diplomacy. The ongoing hostilities are to nobody's benefit, even as innocent hostages and civilian populations continue to suffer," read a statement issued by the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA). "Our Missions in the region are in contact with the Indian community," it added. IANS

Israel's first open attack on IranIran hadn't faced a sustained barrage of fire from a foreign enemy since its 1980s war with Iraq. Explosions could be heard in Tehran until sunrise. "Iran attacked Israel twice, including in locations that endangered civilians, and has paid the price for it," Israeli Revolutionar

added: "If the regime in Iran were to make the mistake of beginning a new round of escalation, we will be obligated to respond." Images released by Israel's military showed members preparing to depart for the strikes in American-made F-15 and F-16 warplanes. The Iranian military described Israel's warplanes as firing lightweight missiles at a distance of 100 km from the Iranian border. Cabinet approves Metro expansion

The State Cabinet on Saturday approved the Hyderabad Metro Rail Phase II expansion covering 76.4 km at a cost of Rs 24,269 crore under the Public Private Partnership (PPP) mode and payment of one DA to government employees that was due for long. The new Metro lines

would be laid on the Nagole-Shamshabad, Raidurgam-Kokapet, MGBS-Chandrayangutta, Miyapur-Patancheru and Nagar-Hayathnagar routes. A Detailed Project Report (DPR) has been prepared and the same would be sent to the Centre for approval. The State Cabinet, which met under the chair-

manship of Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy here on Saturday, also decided to complete the socio-economic and survey of all

castes before November 30. Briefing media persons after the meeting, Revenue Minister Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy said it was decided to lay 16,000-17,000 km of road network, including new roads, under the Panchayat Raj and Roads and Buildings departments.

To this effect, it was decided to take up these works in the erstwhile 10 districts under PPP mode as it would cost Rs 25,000 crore to Rs 28,000 crore. An engineers' committee would be constituted to study the models adopted in other States and prepare a DPR, the Minister said. (SEE PAGE 2)

Stating that the Congress has been facing an internal revolt in Kodangal, BRS working president KT Rama Rao on Saturday called for unity among the BRS cadre to defeat the ruling party in Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy's constituency, regardless of when the local body elections are held. In a significant development, nearly 100 Congress members from Kodangal joined the BRS at Rama Rao's residence in Nandinagar here.

Speaking on the occasion, he said a rebellion against the Congress government had begun in Kodangal. He recalled that Revanth Reddy, who had vehemently opposed the Pharma City

project while in opposition, was now facilitating the establishment of a pharma village in Kodangal, leading to local discontent.

Rama Rao criticised the Congress government for sidelining cost-effective plans to irrigate Kodangal under the Palamuru-Rangareddy project, opting instead for the Kodangal Lift Project for commissions. He

questioned the motives behind awarding contracts to Megha Engineering and Raghava Company, linked to Minister Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy, despite Revanth Reddy's criticism of the firms. He also condemned Congress Ministers for enjoying leisure trips while Telangana was witnessing protests and rasta rokos from Adilabad to Alampur.

He accused Congress leaders of exploiting their positions for personal gain, noting that while Telangana's revenue was declining, the income of Congress leaders was increasing. Bomb threats: Social media sites warned

NEW DELHI

Amid a spate of hoax bomb threats to multiple airlines, the IT Ministry has asked social media platforms to observe due diligence obligations and promptly remove or disable access to misinformation within the strict timelines prescribed under IT rules.

The Centre also asserted that apart from removing or disabling access to such misinformation, social media intermediaries have additional liability under the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023 (BNSS) to mandatorily report certain offences perceived to be committed by any user of their platform including those with intent to threaten unity, integrity, sovereignty or security of India.

The Centre, in an advisory, reminded social media intermediaries that they are obligated under IT rules to provide information under their control or possession assist investigative and Vistara received the

agencies within stipulated timeline of up to 72 hours. The move assumes significance as more than 275 flights operated by the Indian carriers received hoax bomb threats in the past 12 days. Most of the threats were issued on social media.

30 flights get hoax threats As many as 33 flights received bomb threats on Saturday, according to sources. The sources said 11 flights each of IndiGo, Air India
