efits over the last one year, the State government owes around Rs 2,000 crore to the retirees during this fiscal.

To clear the dues, the State government recently sought to mortgage TGIIC lands and raise Rs 10,000 crore, of which Rs 2,000 crore will be earmarked for payment of retirement benefits alone.

In fact, the clearance of arrears and retirement benefits was one of the top de-

mands from the employees union representatives during their recent meeting with Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy and Deputy Chief Minister Mallu Bhatti Vikramarka. The retirement benefits range from Rs 25 lakh to Rs 1 crore for the government employees based on their cadre and experience. At present, the pensions and retirement benefits alone account for nearly 13 per cent of the revenue receipts.

With fiscal pressures mounting, economic experts questioned the sustainability of the government's poli-cies, particularly its failure to address long-term financial planning. They warn that unless the Telangana government adopts stringent fiscal reforms, including exploring alternative revenue sources and rationalising expenditures, the rising pension liabilities could trigger a deeper economic crisis.

Community in crisis over lack of aid, erratic power supply

It was barely a year ago that farmers in Maharashtra, Karnataka and other States staged protests demanding their governments to replicate 24x7 power supply, Rythu Bandhu, Rythu Bima and similar schemes from Telangana to help them.

In Maharashtra, farmer rights activist Vinayakrao Patil had even staged a hunger strike demanding the Telangana model for Maharashtra's farmers, prompting the then Chief Minister Eknath Shinde to announce a committee to examine the feasibility of the model there. However, for farmers in Telangana, who held their heads high as their counterparts in other States envied them, all those days now feel like from an-

For them, erratic power supply, a complete absence of any financial assistance from the government for two consecutive seasons, protests for water for cultivation, fertilizers, seeds and even procurement of their crops have become the order of the day, a far cry from when many repeatedly said 'farmer is truly king in Telangana'.

formation of Telangana, a crop holiday was declared for the left canal of the Nagarjuna Sagar Project for the Yasangi season in December 2023 due to nonavailability of water. Since then, misery has come in train loads. In the January -March season this year, many farmers in Karimnagar, Nalgonda, Mahabubnagar and other districts were forced to rely on water tankers to save their standing crops, especially paddy. This was an alien practice in the last 10 years in Telangana. Shelling exorbitant prices ranging from Rs.2000 to Rs.2500 for private tankers, the farmers had to arrange them to save their crops. About 15 tankers were required to supply sufficient water to

'TG regressive under Cong'

BRS working president KT Rama Rao criticised the Congress government in Telangana for State's economic downturn, attributing it to "inexperience, incompetence, and corruption."

He stated that Telangana, which thrived during K Chandrashekhar decade-long rule, is now regressing in multiple sectors.

Citing the Transport Department's revenue as a key economic indicator, he said Telangana is the only State in south India to record a decline in it. While neighbouring States recorded growth between 8% and 32% in vehicle registrations and revenue, he said Telangana's numbers have dropped. "Declining registrations of heavy vehicles show shrinking people's

purchasing power and dete-

riorating economic conditions," he said. Between April and November, Telangana recorded revenue of Rs 4,392 crore in 2023-24 against Rs 4,389 crore in 2024-25. He said the Congress regime is prioritising political vendettas over governance. He urged the government to focus on restoring economic stability and maintaining the progressive momentum achieved during

State under grip of severe cold wave

The severe cold wave that gripped the northern parts of Telangana State will continue till Tuesday, according to the IMD-Hyderabad forecast on Sunday. Chilly weather conditions are also expected to continue in Hyderabad and its outskirts, with minimum temperatures likely to drop below 10 degrees Celsius at different

By the early hours of Sunday, the minimum temperature at several locations in Adilabad and Kumram Bheem Asifabad districts anywhere hovered between 6.3 degrees Celsius and 7 degrees Celsius. Hyderabad and its neighbouring districts were also under the grip of intense chilly weather conditions, with the BHEL area in Sangareddy district recording singledigit temperature at 9.6 degrees Celsius.

Tabla virtuoso Zakir Hussain dies of heart-related issues

Renowned tabla virtuoso Zakir Hussain (73) succumbed to heart-related issues on Sunday. Hussain's manager, Nirmala Bachani, said in a statement that the maestro was battling blood pressure-related problems. Earlier, it was learned that

Hussain had been admitted to a hospital in San Francisco after experiencing heart-related problems.

Ustaad Zakir Hussain, the renowned tabla maestro, was born on March 9, 1951, in Mumbai. As the eldest son of illustrious tabla player Allah Rakha, he was naturally drawn towards music from a young age. He completed his primary education from St Michael's High School in Mahim, Mumbai, and later gradu-



ated from St Xavier's College and further solidified his foundation in music and academics. Hussain married Antonia Minnecola, a Kathak dancer and teacher. They have two daughters Anisa Qureshi and Isabella

Qureshi. Industrialist Harsh Goenka conveyed his con-

dolence over Hussain's passing on social media, saying: "The world falls silent as the tabla loses its maestro. Ustad Zakir Hussain, a rhythmic genius who brought the soul of India to global stages, has left us. I feel privileged to have known him through his connection with HMV and to have witnessed his incredible performance at our home. His beats will echo eternally."
