Doval to attend India-China talks

BEIJING: National Security Advisor Ajit Doval arrived here on Tuesday to take part in the India-China Special Representatives' talks to be held on Wednesday aimed at restoring the bilateral ties stalled for over four years due to the military standoff in eastern Ladakh. Doval will hold the 23rd round of the Special Representatives' (SR) talks with his Chinese counterpart and Foreign Minister Wang

MOSCOW: A senior Russian General was killed by a bomb hidden in a scooter outside his apartment building in Moscow, a day after Ukraine's security service levelled criminal charges against him. A Ukrainian official said the service carried out the attack. Lt. Gen. Igor Kirillov, the chief of the military's nuclear, biological and chemical protection forces, was killed as he left for his office.

KOCHI: Cardinal George Jacob Koovakad said that Pope Francis' visit to India will most likely be after 2025, which has been announced as the 'Jubilee Year' by the Catholic Church, due to celebrations in Rome that year. Fifty-one-yearold Koovakad was elevated to the rank of cardinal by Pope Francis on December 7. On his arrival in Kerala, he thanked evervone who showed up to greet him at the airport here. PTI

Khammam shocker! Rat bites paralyse student

Class X girl bitten by rats 15 times at BC Welfare Hostel

KHAMMAM

In yet another shocker from State-run hostels in Telangana, a Class 10 student at the BC Welfare Hostel at Danavaigudem in Khammam was bitten by rats multiple times, with both her legs being paralysed now.

The student, Lakshmi Bhavani Keerthy, was said to have been bitten 15 times by rats, and she was administered anti-rabies vaccine each time she was bitten from March to November. This resulted in paralysis, family members alleged.

She was shifted to the Mamata General Hospital in Khammam as the hospital came forward to provide free treatment to the student at the directions of former Minister Puvvada Ajay Kumar. The doctors said the student was currently recovering but suffering from neurological problems.

Responding to the incident, BRS MLA T Harish Rao expressed concern over the condition of the student and accused the government of acting negligently towards students studying

NIRMAL: Five students from a Telangana Minority Residential School fell sick, reportedly due to food poisoning, at Chincholi village in Sarangapur mandal on Tuesday. Sources said that the students complained of stomachache after dinner at the school on Monday and were admitted to a government general hospital in the district headquarters. They were discharged by evening. They were hospitalised due to food poisoning at the hostel. The principal of the school was unavailable for comment.

Decision on NEET in online or offline mode soon: Centre

NEW DELHI

The Education and Health Ministry are deliberating on whether to conduct medical entrance exam NEET-UG in pen and paper mode or online mode and a decision in this regard is expected soon, Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan said on Tuesday. The Education Ministry has held two rounds of talks with the Health Ministry led by union Minister JP Nadda.

Currently, NEET-UG is conducted offline — in pen and paper mode wherein students have to solve multiple choice questions on an OMR sheet. The NEET is the largest entrance exam in the country in terms of number of candidates appearing for the test. In 2024, a record over 24 lakh candidates

took the exam.
"The Administrative
Ministry of NEET is the Health Ministry hence we are in talks with about whether them NEET should be conducted in pen and paper mode or online mode. We have had two rounds of talks with the Health Ministry led by JP Nadda. Whatever option will be considered best suited for conducting the exam, NTA is ready to undertake the exercise," Pradhan

Govt defends simultaneous elections, opposition terms move 'dictatorial'

NEW DELHI

Two Bills that lay down the mechanism to hold simultaneous elections were introduced in the Lok Sabha after a fiery debate on Tuesday, with the opposition terming the move "dictatorial" and Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal asserting that the legislation would not tamper with the powers en-

joyed by States. The Constitution (129th Amendment) Bill was introduced in the Lok Sabha by Meghwal after a nearly 90minute debate, followed by a division of votes. As many as 269 members voted in favour of the Bill and 198 against it. Meghwal also introduced The union Territories Amendment Bill, which seeks to align elections in the union territories of Puducherry, Delhi, and

Jammu and Kashmir with the Lok Sabha polls.

He said the proposed Bills did not attack the "basic structure doctrine, as claimed by the opposition". Principles such as judicial review, federal character of the Constitution, separation of powers, secular character, supremacy of the Constitution had not changed, Meghwal said, adding that the objections to the Bill were political in nature.

Congress member Manish Tewari opposed the introduction of the Bills and termed the move an assault on the basic structure doctrine that stipulates certain features of the Constitution are beyond the amending power of Parliament. "One of the essential features is federalism and the structure of our democracy. The Bills assault the basic structure of the Constitution and exceed the legislative competence of this House,' Tewari, a former union Minister, said. Samajwadi Party member Dharmendra Yadav said the measure to introduce "one nation, one election" by the BJP was an attempt to bring dictatorship in the country.

Assembly on the boil over State's mounting debts

The Telangana Legislative Assembly witnessed heated exchanges between the treasury and the opposition benches over the State's mounting debts.

Deputy Chief Minister Mallu Bhatti Vikramarka and former Finance Minister T Harish Rao sparred over the fiscal management of the Congress government's first year in power. While Bhatti Vikramarka claimed that the State government raised loans of around Rs 51,277 crore, Harish Rao countered that the State debts as of Tuesday had escalated to a whopping Rs 1.27 lakh crore, including both guaranteed and non-

guaranteed loans. The row began during Question Hour when Bhatti informed the House that in the first year after coming to power till November 30 this year, the Congress obtained Rs 52,118 crore under FRBM, Rs 61,991.14 crore under non-FRBM loans obtained by various corporations, public sector undertakings and special purpose vehicles with government guarantees and another Rs 10,099.7 crore loans without guarantees.

Harish countered with a detailed breakdown, charging the Congress with incurring Rs 1.27 lakh crore in loans, including Rs 61,991 crore under corporate guarantees and Rs 10,099 crore without guarantees as well as Rs 3,000 crore fresh loan obtained as of Tuesday. "If this trend continues, Telangana's debt will surge to Rs 6.36 lakh crore in the Congress government's five-year term," he warned. He also dismissed Congress' claim

that Rs 6.71 lakh crore was borrowed during the BRS regime, asserting the total was Rs 4.17 lakh crore. "The Congress presented a white paper to mislead the public. Despite obtaining record loans and enjoying robust revenue, pending bills remain unpaid, and no new have been schemes launched," he said, condemning the attempts to inflate the debts obtained under the previous BRS regime to blame it for the Congress government's shortcomings. Class VII student ends life

HYDERABAD: A Class VII student died by suicide in his hostel room at a residential school in Hayathnagar in the early hours of Tuesday. The 12-year-old, who was staying in the hostel located on the school campus, was upset over an issue and took the extreme step. According to police officials, on Monday, in the absence of his roommate, the boy restored to the extreme step. His friends grew suspicious when there was no response from inside even after repeated knocking on the door. They alerted the hostel authorities, who used force to break open the door, only to find the boy dead.

Over 3 lakh candidates skip Group-II exam

Over 3 lakh candidates skipped the Telangana Group-II recruitment examination that concluded in the State on Sunday. A significant reason for such substantial absenteeism by candidates was the allotment of centres, many of which were located at far-flung places. Some students were also turned away for arriving just minutes late.

For reasons best known to them, the Telangana Public Service Commission allotted examination centres 30 to 50 km away from where the aspirants reside. Many candidates from Hyderabad were assigned centres in Ibrahimpatnam and Ghatkesar, requiring a long commute. "I was allotted a cenin Guru Nanak educational institutions in

Ibrahimpatnam, while I re-

side in Khairatabad. Who would travel for such a long distance for two days? Hence, I decided to drop," said a Group aspirant.

After commuting long distances to reach the centre, several students were denied entry into the examination hall as they were late by just a

minute. Candidates' repeated pleas to centre officials did not yield any response, forcing students to return without writing the examination for which they prepared for several years. The Group-II notification for 783 vacancies attracted 5,51,855 registra-
