#### Cop ends life in Amberpet

**HYDERABAD:** A police constable, posted at the Pargi police station in Vikarabad district, reportedly died by suicide at his house in Amberpet in the city on Sunday. A 2002 batch constable, Bhanu Shanker worked in Vikarabad while his wife and two children stayed at Amberpet. On Sunday, while the family was at home, the constable went into a room and hanged himself from a ceiling fan. The family tried to revive him, but their efforts failed.

#### 4 Naxalites, cop killed in encounter

# Skeletal fluorosis back to haunt Nalgonda

#### New cases signal potential public health issue

Besides cases of dental fluorosis that were detected in Marriguda mandal of Nalgonda district recently, resurgence of skeletal fluorosis in a cluster of villages has also been confirmed.

A few skeletal fluorosis cases were identified during an intensive survey taken up by the Department of Medical and Health in selective pockets and it has signalled a potential public health issue, also reigniting connation issues in the region.

The effective implementation of Mission Bhagiratha in recent times, after the programme had ensured freedom from the fluoride Implementation of Mission Bhagiratha in recent times, after it ended fluoride menace 3 years ago, now under question

menace three years ago, is now under question.

Health staff had conducted over 34,800 door-todoor contacts to identify serious fluorosis symptoms, focusing on children and opuiation in the aifected villages.

While the number of skeletal fluorosis cases among the elderly is not large enough, the potential for a wider outbreak re-

mains a pressing concern, said officials. The resurgence of both skeletal and dental fluorosis in villages with a history of fluoride contamination prompted the district administration to re-evaluate

the drinking water supply under Mission Bhagiratha, with effective implementation of the programme running into glitches of late. With evidence pointing to water contamination as a contributing factor, ensuring safe and clean water for

all residents is now a top priority. Health ex tioned that while the immediate numbers may not be alarming, the possibility of a fluorosis relapse could have long-term implications.

#### Speeding truck mows down family, 3 killed

In a heart-wrenching incident, three members of a family were killed, while a child is battling for life, after a truck hit their twowheeler, at Medchal on Sunday. Those killed have been identified as Bullabbai (37), Lavanya (30) and Harshita (10), while fouryear-old Siddeshwar is undergoing treatment.

According to the police, the family was going from Uppal towards Yellampet Medchal to visit their relatives. Around 4 pm, a container truck with a Nagaland registration number hit their two-wheeler from behind and ran over them.

The former Minister also criticised Revanth Reddy for statements suggesting that Telangana, especially

the condition of government employees, was better off in erstwhile Andhra Pradesh, calling it an insult to the State's achievements. "Under K Chandrashekhar Rao, Telangana provided the highest salaries to employees and completed transformative projects like Kaleshwaram Lift Irrigation Scheme and Mission Bhagiratha. Revanth Reddy's baseless claims only indicate the Congress's bankruptcy of ideas and leadership," he said.

Drawing attention to the previous BRS government's track record, Rama Rao said under Chandrashekhar Rao. over Rs 1 lakh crore was spent on initiatives like Rythu Bandhu and crop loan waivers. "While Chandrashekhar Rao will be remembered as a farmer's true ally, Revanth Reddy has turned out to be their worst enemy," he asserted.

### Adilabad villagers attack forest officials

Tension prevailed for a while when some villagers allegedly pelted stones on forest officials and van-dalised a vehicle after officials seized timber logs at Keshavapatnam village in Echoda mandal on Sunday.

Forest officials said that a team of around 50 forest officials led by Utnoor FDO Revanth Chandra were carrying out raids on houses of certain suspects at the village known for felling teak trees and smuggling the timber, after receiving in-

formation about a huge dump of timber. Some residents began pelting stones on the officials, and damaged the windshield of a vehicle of the department re-

sulting in the tension.

The officials said that some villagers surrounded the forest officials and partially damaged a windshield of an official vehicle for conducting the raids. Forest officials were forced to run for safety. No official sustained injury in the incident. A complaint will be lodged with the police. Timber worth Rs 3.5 lakh was seized during the raids. ## No entry in OYO for unmarried couples

NEW DELHI

Travel booking major OYO has launched a new checkin policy for partner hotels, starting from Meerut, introducing guidelines effective this year whereby unmarried couples will no longer be welcome to check in.

Under the revised policy, all couples will be asked to present valid proof of relationship at the time of check-in, including for bookings made online. OYO has empowered its partner hotels' discretion to decline

couple bookings based on their judgment, aligning with local social sensibility, the company said.

OYO has given the directive to its partner hotels in Meerut to ensure this with immediate effect. Based on ground feedback, the company may expand this to more cities, people familiar

with the policy change said. "OYO has received feedback in the past from civil society groups, especially in Meerut (Uttar Pradesh), urging action to address this issue," they said. (SEE PAGE 2)
