Chilli farmer ends life in Khammam KHAMMAM: A farmer,

Bonagiri Uppalaiah (43) of Mangalagudem village in Khammam rural mandal died, reportedly by suicide. After receiving information from the villagers on Wednesday evening about Uppalaiah hanging himself from a tree in his field, his son rushed to the spot and found him dead. The police registered a case. According to the family, Uppalaiah took four acres on lease from a farmer in the village in addition to his own one acre and cultivated chillies. But as he could not earn enough from the harvest, he ended his life.

3 terrorists, three cops killed in J&K

JAMMU: Three terrorists and an equal number of policemen were killed and seven others, including a Deputy Superintendent of Police injured, in a fierce day-long gunfight in a remote forested area of Jammu and Kashmir's Kathua district, officials said on Thursday. The encounter started around 8 am amid intensified operations led by the Jammu and Kashmir Police against a recently infiltrated group of ultras believed to be members of JeM, the officials said. It was not clear if it was the same group that had been evading an earlier cordon. PTI

Assembly adopts resolution against delimitation

HYDERABAD

The Telangana Legislative Assembly on Thursday adopted a resolution asserting that population should not be the sole yardstick for the delimitation of Lok Sabha constituencies, with Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy claiming such a criteria could lead to a six per cent drop in the representation of southern states in the Lok Sabha seats.

Moving the resolution, he said the representation of southern states in LS seats could fall from 24 per cent to 19 per cent if delimitation is carried out on a population basis.

Without naming the BJP, he alleged that the party in power at the Centre is trying to create a situation of making southern states irrelevant in formation of the Central government by reducing their representation in the Lok Sabha seats.

He appealed to the parties in Telangana to jointly speak to the Centre to safeguard the State's interests. "If the Centre is on the same page (to our cause) fine, otherwise, we need to build a struggle,"

After the Centre, it is the turn of the Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) report to effectively dismantle the Congress government's allegations that the previous BRS regime had pushed Telangana into excessive debt. As per the actual expenditure, the total outstanding debts and liabili-ties of Telangana stood at Rs 5.24 lakh crore as of March 31, 2024, the report, tabled in the Assembly on

Thursday reveals. This includes Rs 4,03,664 crore of budgetary borrowings, Rs 1,20,944 crore in off-Budget borrowings obtained by corporations and special purpose vehicles under the State government guarantees and also Rs 6,949 crore, which was extended back-to-back loans to compensate for the GST shortfall caused by the Covid-19 pandemic and subsequent economic slowdown.

Harish calls out CM, Bhatti's stark contradictions

Senior BRS MLA T Harish Rao on Thursday exposed the glaring contradictions in statements by Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy and his deputy, Finance Minister Mallu Bhatti Vikramarka.

Addressing the after the Appropriation Bill was passed by voice vote in the Assembly, Harish Rao said he wanted to thank Bhatti Vikramarka for revealing the truth in the Assembly, by stating that the Congress government had spent Rs 88,564 crore to repay loans during its 16month rule, a statement made by Bhatti at 7.44 pm.

The Chief Minister, meanwhile, speaking at 3.58 pm the same day in the same Assembly, had claimed that Rs 1.53,359 crore was paid towards debts and interest. "This contradiction within a few hours exposes the inconsistency in their claims," the former Finance Minister said, adding that it was clear



that Bhatti Vikramarka was speaking the truth, whereas the Chief Minister inflated figures by including corporation borrowings as well. Even the CAG report, tabled in the Assembly had on page 12 supported Bhatti Vikramarka's figures.

Housing sales in Hyderabad plummet by 49%: Report

As reality bites Hyderabad realty, the city property market appears to be in even more dire straits than was being assumed so far.

The latest Anarock data does document a year-onyear dip in housing sales and launches across major cities for the first quarter, the decline is the steepest for Hyderabad with plummeting figures. According to the Anarock report released on Thursday, the data for this year's first quarter saw residential sales in Hyderabad drop by 49 per cent against the same period in 2024.

In the Q1-2024, while 19,660 residential units were sold, the same came down drastically to 10,100 units sold in Q1-2025. Across seven major cities - Mumbai Metropolitan Region

(MMR), Pune, Bengaluru, National Capital Region (NCR), Hyderabad, Chennai and Kolkata — approximately 93,280 units were sold in the first quarter, a 26 per cent decrease over Q1 2024 when 1,30,170 units were absorbed.

Though most cities had a negative change in sales for the period, Hyderabad's sales decline was the most hurting, at 49 per cent, followed by Kolkata with 31 per cent drop. Bengaluru, however, could resist the decline to some extent and halting it at 16 per cent. In terms of the new launches, Anarock data reveal that the top seven cities saw approximately 1,00,020 units launched in

Trump slaps 25% tariff on auto imports

WASHINGTON

President Donald Trump on Wednesday said he was placing 25 per cent tariffs on auto imports, a move the White House claims would foster domestic manufacturing but could also put a financial squeeze on automakers that depend on global supply chains.

"This will continue to spur growth. We'll effectively be charging a 25 per cent tariff," Trump said.

The tariffs, which the White House expects to raise \$100 billion in revenue annually, could be complicated as even US automakers source their components from around the world. The tax hike starting April means automakers could face higher costs and lower sales, though Trump argues that the tariffs will lead to more factories open-

ing in the United States and the end of what he judges to be a "ridiculous" supply chain in which auto parts and finished vehicles are manufactured across the US, Canada and Mexico.

After a week of respite brought in by thunder and hail storms, temperatures are expected to start soaring again across the State. The Indian Meteorologi-

cal Department (IMD)-Hyderabad on Thursday issued an orange alert for 15 districts in Telangana with a forecast of temperature hovering between 41°C and 44°C. While maintaining that dry weather will continue throughout the State, the IMD-Hyderabad in its forecast said, "Maximum temperatures are likely to gradually rise by 2°C and 3°C during next few days".

The districts where maximum temperatures will hover between 41°C and 44°C include Adilabad, Kothagudem, Jagtial, Jayashankar Bhupalapally,

Jogulamba Gadwal, Khammam. Kumuram Bheem Asifabad, Mancherial, Mulugu, Nagarkurnool, Narayanpet, Nirmal, Nizamabad, Peddapalli and Wanaparthy.

Temperatures in remaining districts are expected to hover between 36°C and 40°C. On Wednesday, nine districts — Adilabad (41°C), Kumaram Bheem Asifabad

(40.9°C), Nizamabad and Wanaparthy Kothagudem Bhadradri $(40.7^{\circ}C),$ Kamareddy (40.6°C), Nirmal (40.5°C), Mancherial (40.4°C) and Nalgonda recorded the highest maximum temperature of 40.1°C. The temperatures in others parts, including Hyderabad, hovered around 38-39°C.
